3	SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
4	This Act may be cited as the "Northern Border Secu-
5	rity Review Act".
6	SEC. 2. DEFINITIONS.
7	In this Act:
8	(1) Appropriate congressional commit-
9	TEES.—The term "appropriate congressional com-
10	mittees" means—
11	(A) the Committee on Homeland Security
12	and Governmental Affairs of the Senate

1	(B) the Committee on Appropriations of
2	the Senate;
3	(C) the Committee on Homeland Security
4	of the House of Representatives; and
5	(D) the Committee on Appropriations of
6	the House of Representatives.
7	(2) NORTHERN BORDER.—The term "Northern
8	Border' means the land and maritime borders be-
9	tween the United States and Canada.
10	SEC. 3. NORTHERN BORDER THREAT ANALYSIS.
11	(a) In General.—Not later than 180 days after the
12	date of enactment of this Act, the Secretary of Homeland
13	Security shall submit a Northern Border threat analysis
14	to the appropriate congressional committees that in-
15	cludes—
16	(1) current and potential terrorism and crimi-
17	nal threats posed by individuals and organized
18	groups seeking—
19	(A) to enter the United States through the
20	Northern Border; or
21	(B) to exploit border vulnerabilities on the
22	Northern Border;
23	(2) improvements needed at ports of entry
24	along the Northern Border—

1	(A) to prevent terrorists and instruments
2	of terror from entering the United States; and
3	(B) to reduce criminal activity, as meas-
4	ured by the total flow of illegal goods, illicit
5	drugs, and smuggled and trafficked persons
6	moved in either direction across to the North-
7	ern Border;
8	(3) improvements needed between ports of entry
9	along the Northern Border, including the maritime
10	borders of the Great Lakes—
11	(A) to prevent terrorists and instruments
12	of terror from entering the United States; and
13	(B) to reduce criminal activity, as meas-
14	ured by the total flow of illegal goods, illicit
15	drugs, and smuggled and trafficked persons
16	moved in either direction across the Northern
17	Border; and
18	(4) vulnerabilities in law, policy, cooperation be-
19	tween State, tribal, and local law enforcement, inter-
20	national agreements, or tribal agreements that
21	hinder effective and efficient border security,
22	counter-terrorism, anti-human smuggling and traf-
23	ficking efforts, and the flow of legitimate trade along
24	the Northern Border.

1	(b) Analysis Requirements.—For the threat anal-
2	ysis required under subsection (a), the Secretary of Home-
3	land Security shall consider and examine—
4	(1) technology needs and challenges;
5	(2) personnel needs and challenges;
6	(3) the role of State, tribal, and local law en-
7	forcement in general border security activities;
8	(4) the need for cooperation among Federal,
9	State, tribal, local, and Canadian law enforcement
10	entities relating to border security; and
11	(5) the geographic challenges of the Northern
12	Border.
13	(c) Classified Threat Analysis.—To the extent
14	possible, the Secretary of Homeland Security shall submit
15	the threat analysis required under subsection (a) in un-
16	classified form. The Secretary may submit a portion of
17	the threat analysis in classified form if the Secretary de-
18	termines that such form is appropriate for that portion.
