 - 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
 - 4 This Act may be cited as the "Upholding the Law

1	SEC. 2. INVESTIGATION AND REPORT ON VETTING AND
2	PROCESSING OF ILLEGAL ALIENS APPRE-
3	HENDED ALONG THE SOUTHWEST BORDER
4	AND ENSURING THAT ALL LAWS ARE BEING

6	Not less frequently than every 60 days until there
7	have been fewer than 35,000 apprehensions per month at
8	the southwest border for 3 consecutive months, the Inspec-
9	tor General of the Department of Homeland Security shall
10	conduct an investigation and submit a report and provide
11	a briefing to the President, the Secretary of Homeland
12	Security, the Attorney General, the Committee on Home-
13	land Security and Governmental Affairs of the Senate,
14	and the Committee on Homeland Security of the House
15	of Representatives regarding, with respect to the period
16	beginning on January 20, 2021—
17	(1) the vetting procedures applicable to aliens
18	(as defined in section 101(a) of the Immigration and
19	Nationality Act (8 U.S.C. 1101(a))) seeking entry or
20	admission to the United States who were appre-
21	hended along the southwest border of the United
22	States, including the process for conducting in-per-
23	son interviews with such aliens and the number of
24	such interviews that were conducted;
25	(2) the total number of aliens who are unlaw-
26	fully present in the United States (referred to in this

section as "illegal aliens") who were processed and
released into the interior of the United States;
(3) the number of illegal aliens who received pa-
role (humanitarian or otherwise);
(4) the results of the audit of parole applica-
tions, including the justification for any instances in
which parole was granted;
(5) the total number of illegal aliens who have
been placed in removal proceedings pursuant to sec-
tion 240 of the Immigration and Nationality Act (8
U.S.C. 1229a), including—
(A) how many of such illegal aliens have
been removed; and
(B) how many of such illegal aliens are eli-
gible for any immigration benefit, such as asy-
lum or lawful permanent residence;
(6) the results of the audit of asylum applica-
tion under section 208 of the Immigration and Na-
tionality Act (8 U.S.C. 1158);
(7) the total number of illegal aliens who have
been placed in expedited removal proceedings pursu-
ant to section 235(b)(1) of the Immigration and Na-
tionality Act (8 U.S.C. 1225(b)(1)), including how
many have been removed;

1	(8) the efforts of the Department of Homeland
2	Security to continually monitor all of the illegal
3	aliens who were apprehended along the southwest
4	border of the United States and then released on pa-
5	role, including—
6	(A) the number of such illegal aliens who
7	were given a "notice to report" to a U.S. Immi-
8	gration and Customs Enforcement office;
9	(B) the number of such illegal aliens who
10	actually reported in compliance with such notice
11	to report;
12	(C) the number of such illegal aliens who
13	were given a "notice to appear" before an im-
14	migration judge; and
15	(D) the number of such illegal aliens who
16	have prior criminal convictions or terms of im-
17	prisonment in the United States or outside of
18	the United States;
19	(9) the total number of illegal aliens who were
20	processed and released into the interior of the
21	United States without participating in an alter-
22	natives to detention program, such as using an ankle
23	monitor or another tracking monitor; and
